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Special Olympics Canada provides a full continuum of sport training and competitive opportunities for athletes with an intellectual disability.

The Sport Model is developed to provide a schematic overview of what type of sport training and competitive opportunities an athlete can experience.


The Sport Model is based upon the following guiding principles:

- 1. The Athlete is paramount.
- 2. The Coach supports the athlete.
- 3. The Athlete deserves quality sport training opportunities.
- 4. Through training and conditioning the Athlete enters the competitive sport environment.

Special Olympics Canada's mandate, to provide quality sport training and competitive opportunities, is augmented by the responsibility to ensure that an athlete also has a variety of sporting opportunities available to them. Therefore, within the broader Canadian Amateur Sport System, Special Olympics Canada has a role in accessing additional sport training and opportunities for athletes with an intellectual disability.

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The official languages of SOC are English and French. All official publications of SOC shall be produced in both official languages. In the event of an inadvertent conflict in translation of these official publications, the English version shall govern and take precedence.

Use these guidelines when speaking, writing, or referring to people with disabilities, ensuring that everyone is portrayed with individuality and with dignity.

### **Appropriate Terminology:**

- A person *has an intellectual disability* rather than is suffering from, afflicted with, or a victim of an intellectual disability.
- Always use people-first language, placing the person before the disability (e.g. person with an intellectual disability <u>not</u> "the intellectually disabled" or the "intellectually disabled person"
- Distinguish between adults and children with an intellectual disability. Use adults or children, or older or younger athletes. Never generalize as kids
- **Down syndrome** has replaced "Down's syndrome"
- Refer to participants in Special Olympics as *athletes*. In no case should the word appear in quotation marks.
- The words "Special Olympics" are never written without the "s" at the end of "Olympics" ie Special Olympics programs, Special Olympics athletes, Special Olympics Games, etc.

# **Terminology to Avoid:**

- Refer to the person's disability only when it is relevant and necessary.
- **Do not** use the label kids when referring to Special Olympics athletes. Adult athletes are an integral part of the program.
- Do not use the adjective unfortunate when talking about persons with an intellectual disability. Disabling conditions do not have to be life defining in a negative way.
- **Do not use the word "the" in front of Special Olympics** unless describing a specific Olympics event or Games.

Do not sensationalize the accomplishments of persons with disabilities. While these accomplishments should be recognized, beware of the negative impact in referring to the achievements of people with a physical or intellectual disability with excessive hyperbole.

Do not overuse the word "special" when talking about persons with an intellectual disability. The term is distancing and describes that which is different about a person. Focus on athletes' accomplishments and goals.



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#### **Proper Commonly Used Words/Terms:**

- **Person(s) with a disability**, <u>not</u> disabled, handicapped, crippled
- Person who has .... or Person with, not crippled by, afflicted with, suffering from, victim of, deformed
- **Person who uses a wheelchair**, <u>not</u> Confined, bound, restricted to, dependent on a wheelchair
- Person who is Deaf, hearing impaired, not Deaf and dumb, deaf mute, hearing impaired
- **Person with a intellectual disability**, <u>not</u> Retarded, mentally retarded
- **Person with a physical disability**, <u>not</u> Physically challenged
- Person with a intellectual disability, Person who has schizophrenia, Person who has ..., not Mental patient, mentally ill, mental, insane
- **Person with a learning disability**, <u>not</u> Learning disabled, learning difficulty
- **Persons who are visually impaired, blind**, <u>not</u> Visually impaired (as a collective noun)

If in doubt, ask. Most people with a disability will be more than willing to help you.

This policy is intended to provide Chapters with a basic framework for a volunteer program. Chapters could implement additional policies and structures to address their specific concerns, resources, laws or needs.

#### 1. Categories of Volunteers

The following two categories of volunteers should be recognized:

- a) Year Round Volunteers: those who are, or may be, in regular close physical contact with athletes (such as coaches, chaperons, drivers, etc.) and those volunteers who have administrative or fiscal responsibilities (such as committee members)
- b) <u>Special Events Volunteers:</u> those who volunteer for one day or single events, and where they have limited involvement with athletes or in fiscal affairs.

#### 2. Applications

Those wishing to be Year Round Volunteers must apply to Special Olympics to be considered. This process would consist of three stages.

#### a) Interview

During this stage the volunteer coordinator would meet with the applicant to ascertain:

- a) Area of interest
- b) Background, skills, resources of the applicant
- c) Time, commitment available
- d) Suitability for positions available
- e) Suitability as a volunteer

All prospective volunteers would be asked to supply two references from people unrelated to them, and to sign a volunteer application form (Appendix 1). This form would ask the applicant to disclose any criminal records he/she may have and to authorize personal and character checks, including a police record check. Each Chapter should obtain the appropriate form of consent from the police force which will conduct the records check.

- b) Follow-up: During this stage the volunteer coordinator would contact the references provided and ask them a standard series of questions (appendix 2). The police record check need only be m ade as required to assist in determining if an applicant is suitable to act as a volunteer for Special Olympics. If there is sound reason to suspect an applicant for past criminal behaviour, a record check should be required.
  - Note: Where police record checks are available, the police force may require the Chapter to enter into a written agreement dealing with all records checks. That agreement should be reviewed by the Chapter's lawyer.

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#### c) <u>Decision Regarding Suitability of Applicant</u>

This decision would be based on:

- a) The needs of the position
- b) The needs of the applicant
- c) The results of the interview
- d) The results of the reference/police checks

Those applicants who are perceived to be a risk to an athlete, volunteer or to the organization, are not to be placed in any position where this risk may materialize.

Note: If an applicant has a criminal record they are not necessarily refused. Such situations
would have to be dealt with individually by each Chapter

All placements to have a minimum three (3) month probationary clause.

#### 3. Registration

- a) Year Round Volunteers must register annually, or as per policy of Special Olympics Canada, by completing the Special Olympics Canada or Chapter Registration Form;
- b) Special events Volunteers may register the day of the event but prior to volunteering (Appendix 3)

#### 4. Orientation

All volunteers should receive a basic orientation to Special Olympics and its expectations of them in relation to the responsibilities to be assumed by them.

 Note: A basic orientation package should be developed Nationally. Chapters could then build on this package with additional orientation and training focused on each Chapter's programs and policies. Position descriptions for all volunteer jobs should be developed. During the orientation, the appropriate descriptions should be reviewed with the applicant.

#### 5. Training

All chapters must commit to the development of skills and knowledge of volunteers that will assist them in performance of their duties.

National minimum requirements for certain volunteer positions should be drafted, especially for those positions more sensitive or in risk associated areas.

Support programs should be considered to encourage volunteers to further develop their skills (i.e. grants, subsidized training programs, mentoring, etc.)

#### 6. Evaluation

While evaluation of all volunteers on a regular basis would be ideal, it is doubtful that with the current resources available this could be achieved.

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All new volunteers should be evaluated prior to the competition of their probationary period. The complexity of this evaluation would be dependent on the level of responsibility held by the volunteer. Applicants who put athletes or the organization at risk should be released immediately.

Volunteers who are inappropriately placed in a position should be given the opportunity to try a different position for which they may be better suited.

While it should always be our goal to assist volunteers to succeed, at times it may become evident that action must be taken to change a volunteer's performance or to remove a volunteer. A volunteer code of conduct Policy (Appendix 4) should be implemented which guide this process.

#### 7. Recognition

Each Chapter should develop and implement a recognition program for volunteers. Recognition should be appropriate to the involvement and responsibilities. National opportunities (i.e. Coach of the Year) should be blended into the Chapter program.

#### CONCLUSION

The implementation of this proposal and resulting policies will not guarantee that all volunteers placed will be suitable for the task assigned. It is hoped, however, that by following the guidelines established here, every effort would have been made to reduce the risk involved through appropriate placement of volunteers.

#### **NOMINATIONS**

Each Special Olympics Chapter office is encouraged to nominate <u>one</u> (1) male and <u>one</u> (1) female coach whom they feel is worthy of receiving this prestigious award. Nominations must be endorsed by the Special Olympics Chapter Office and forwarded to the National Office by <u>JULY 1</u>. All nominations must be accompanied by a Nomination Form (attached), two (2) letters of reference and a passport size photo.

\* NOTE: Any additional forms/letters of support will not be considered by the Selection Committee when reviewing the nominations.

Special Olympics Canada Awards Selection Committee will carefully review the nominations, and from them select the top three (3) male and three (3) female finalists for Coach of the Year. The finalists' names will then be forwarded to all Chapter Offices for review. The Chapter Offices will have two weeks to confer with their constituents and forward their selection to the National Office for final tabulation. Award recipients will be notified immediately by the National Office.

#### **AWARD CRITERIA**

Nominations will be judged on the strength of their submission by the criteria described in the following:

#### I) CONTRIBUTION TO SPORT IN SPECIAL OLYMPICS

How has the coach contributed to the overall organization, promotion and development of sport in Special Olympics?

#### II) COACHING EFFECTIVENESS

In what way(s) has the coach been effective in assisting the athlete achieve their personal goals in sport? Is the coach ethical and progressive in sport?

#### III) PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Is the coach involved in personal development and coaching education?

#### IV) LEADERSHIP

What is the conduct of the coach? Is the coach a positive role model for the athlete and for other coaches? Does the coach provide stable and consistent leadership qualities? Does the coach teach and practise co-operation, self-discipline, respect for officials and opponents, and proper attitudes in language, dress and deportment?

#### **AWARD RECOGNITION**

- This award will be presented to the recipients at the Sports Celebrities Festival (Toronto) in November/December.
- The recipients will receive a Coach of the Year ring and a certificate and/or plague.
- All nominees will receive a certificate and/or plaque.
- The recipients' names will be added to the Special Olympics Canada "Honour Roll".
- The recipients and nominees will be recognized in the Special Olympics Canada Newsletter.

- The nominee must demonstrate improvement in athletic skill.
- The nominee must demonstrate improvement in personal growth and development.

#### III. SPORTSMANSHIP

- The nominee must exemplify the true spirit of Special Olympics.
- The nominee must display sportsmanship and be considerate of fellow athletes, coaches and officials.

Mr. Harry "Red" Foster, founder of Special Olympics Canada, was an outstanding sportsman, radio broadcast pioneer, entrepreneur, successful businessman, humanitarian and philanthropist. A lifetime of tireless effort on behalf of individuals with a mental disability provided the cornerstone for the formation of this organization. A man of boundless energy, filled with compassion and dedication to the welfare of his fellowman, we honour his memory through the Harry "Red" Foster Award in recognition of meritorious service to individuals with a mental disability.

This Award is made available by Special Olympics Canada for presentation to an individual, Special Olympics Chapter staff or volunteer, who best exemplifies the spirit, philosophy and goals of the Special Olympics movement. Like Mr. Foster, the nominee will have contributed significantly to the development, awareness and success of Special Olympics in Canada.

Please be advised that in order to maintain the integrity of this award, and the individual that it represents, the Harry "Red" Foster Award will only be presented if the nominations submitted to the Special Olympics Canada Board of Directors are deemed suitable. Therefore, this Award may not be issued annually.

Please note that Special Olympics Chapter staff and/or volunteers may be nominated.

#### Nominations forwarded:

- By a Special Olympics Chapter or Provincial/Territorial Board of Director, must be endorsed by the respective Office or at least one Provincial/Territorial Board Member.
- By a member of the Special Olympics' Canada Board of Directors, must be endorsed by at least one other National Board Member.
- From another source must be endorsed by at least one member of the Special Olympics' Canada Board of Directors to be eligible for consideration.

Nominations must be forwarded to the National Office by July 1.



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Nominations will be reviewed and selected by the Special Olympics' Canada Board of Directors.

Nominations must be accompanied by a Nomination Form (attached), two (2) letters of reference, a Profile Form (attached) and a passport size photo.

#### AWARD CRITERIA

To be considered for this Award:

- The nominee has made a significant contribution to the Movement. Service clubs or corporations are not eligible.
- The nominee is well known and highly regarded within his/her Special Olympics Chapter and/or across Canada.
- The nominee has illustrated strong leadership in his/her Special Olympics Chapter and/or throughout Canada and has made an outstanding contribution in one or more of the following areas: sport development, marketing/fundraising, administration, major games, other.
- The nominee is dedicated to the Special Olympics movement and displays characteristics of integrity and exemplary personal conduct.

#### AWARD RECOGNITION

- This award will be presented to the recipient at the Sports Celebrities Festival (Toronto) in November/December.
- The recipient will receive a certificate and/or plaque.
- The recipient will be recognized in the Special Olympics Canada Newsletter.

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Special Olympics Canada is responsible for providing a safe environment, with minimal risk, for all Special Olympics participants. To assist in this endeavour, the following procedures for screening athletes are utilized:

- 1. All athletes must officially register with Special Olympics Canada through the respective Provincial/Territorial Special Olympics Office.
- Each athlete selected to the National Team Program shall undergo a screening process.

- a. Each athlete must be endorsed by their respective Provincial/Territorial Special Olympics Chapter office.
- A post-competition questionnaire (Special Olympics Canada Policy 5000-41), completed by the athlete's Provincial/Territorial Team coach, will form part of the athlete screening process
- c. Each athlete selected to the National Team Program shall participate in an oral interview/meeting during which the requirements of the athlete to maintain appropriate status with the National Team will be outlined and discussed.
- d. Where deemed appropriate, the athlete's parent/guardian may be requested to participate in the interview/meeting
- e. The interview committee shall consist of a representative from each of; the athlete's peer group, Provincial/Territorial Chapter and Special Olympics Canada (or designate).
- f. As part of the screening process, the athlete (or the athlete's parent/guardian, as the case may be, on behalf of the athlete), may be requested to consent to a police records check.\*
- g. Guidelines for the interview/meeting will be provided by Special Olympics Canada in conjunction with the Special Olympics Chapters.

NOTE: \* This would be done only when deemed necessary by the interview committee, and only with special consideration and care, and with as much confidentiality as possible.

\*\* All information regarding the athlete(s) is strictly confidential.
