2013 Special Olympics BC Summer Games a stirring success

Nearly 600 medals awarded in Langley as more than 1,100 athletes inspired everyone watching

The largest Special Olympics BC Summer Games in SOBC history was a huge success in Langley July 11 to 14, with 1,136 athletes from communities all over the province and the Yukon coming together to compete and inspire.

Nearly 600 medals were awarded in 11 sports as the athletes put on a stirring display of the Special Olympics spirit of true sportsmanship, inclusion, inspiration, and joy.

"The courage and determination with which these athletes competed in every event was remarkable to behold. There is no limit to how hard they try. And the Games showed there is no limit to what they can do. They were incredible to watch," said Games Chair Arne Olson.

The impact of Special Olympics was abundantly on display during the 2013 Provincial Games. SOBC – Langley athletes Joshua and Jaykob Low both did well in the Games and happily came home with medals – gold for softball player Jaykob and silver for swimmer Joshua – and their mother Merry also shared how Special Olympics has made "life-changing differences" for Joshua.

"Joshua was sick from the time we brought him home. He endured heart surgery at six months and again at two. Then at age four he was diagnosed with cancer. He spent many years in hospital and Canuck Place with not a lot of hope for a long life," Low wrote. "About four years ago, Josh began Special Olympics, and now at 21 is a healthy, happy athlete who came home from the Games with a silver medal.

"But much more important [than the medal] is the health that he has gained back, and the fact that at 21 he is still here and going strong, with great aspirations of a long sporting future. Thanks to Special Olympics I'm not sure I remember the last time he was in hospital."

An exceptional amount of dedicated volunteers gave their time and generous efforts to make the Games a reality. More than 300 volunteer coaches put in so much time to support the athletes throughout their Games experience and prepare them to be able to perform at their best on this significant stage. And local volunteers responded enthusiastically to the appeal issued to support the SOBC Summer Games, with 1,200 people signing on to help bring the Games to life.

"I think the 2013 SOBC Summer Games was a great success. It was well organized and very well orchestrated overall. The athletes and volunteer coaches were so inspiring both on and off the playing fields, and we so appreciated the 1,200 volunteers who worked so hard to deliver such a rewarding and memorable experience for everyone," SOBC Chair Pam Keith said.

"I was also really pleased to see how many Games volunteers came up to me afterward to ask how they can continue being involved with Special Olympics. In addition to being an amazing experience in itself, I think this Games will leave a great legacy of appreciation and awareness for Special Olympics."

Results from the 2013 SOBC Summer Games will determine which B.C. and Yukon athletes will advance to the 2014 Special Olympics Canada Summer Games set to be held in Vancouver.
