



Virtual Torch Run for Special Olympics BC set to raise funds and heart rates

Runners and walkers across the province are ready to step up and make a difference for Special Olympics BC.

The <u>Virtual Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics BC</u> is coming June 7 to 20. Participants from all over British Columbia will run and walk in their communities to raise vital funds and awareness for Special Olympics athletes and programs. Though the pandemic prevents them from coming together in person, they will come together in spirit to reach the event's distance and fundraising goals.

Led by champions from law enforcement agencies throughout the province, the Virtual Torch Run is open to anyone who wants to support Special Olympics BC's empowering year-round sport, youth, and health programs for people with intellectual disabilities.

"The annual Torch Run is a vital fundraiser for Special Olympics BC's year-round programs and competitions, thanks to our law enforcement friends who work hard to provide athletes with lifechanging opportunities. We're so fortunate that they have successfully converted into a virtual Torch Run that still manages to continue the connections and camaraderie between law enforcement members, SOBC athletes, and many other participating supporters," SOBC President & CEO Dan Howe said

During the two-week event, participants will run and walk as many times as they can, while maintaining physical distancing. They will log their kilometres and fundraising totals online, working together to reach the event's targets: raising \$75,000 and logging 40,000 kilometres.

Inspired by all the athletes who have accepted the challenge of competing in the first-ever <u>Special Olympics BC Provincial Challenge Games</u>, the 2021 Virtual Torch Run challenges participants to raise \$75,000 in order to beat last year's fundraising total of more than \$66,000.

The 40,000-kilometre target honours the 40th anniversary of the global Law Enforcement Torch Run movement. Started in 1981 in Wichita, Kansas, the global Law Enforcement Torch Run has raised more than \$900 million for Special Olympics programs around the world.

"On behalf of the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics BC, I'm excited to announce and build momentum for this important event. This virtual run/walk will allow us to raise vital funds and awareness for SOBC, and it will be very rewarding for everyone who participates. This is an opportunity for us all to put our best foot forward for Special Olympics athletes, so I encourage everyone to get involved and make a difference for SOBC!" said Chief Superintendent Warren Brown, North District RCMP Commander.
