AWARD CATEGORY: COACH OF THE YEAR



These awards are presented to Special Olympics Saskatchewan's most outstanding coaches. Nominated by athletes, volunteers, parents, and community members, award recipients are chosen based on their contributions to sports in coaching effectiveness, professional development, and leadership with Special Olympics.
