

Target sports identified by sports council

With each Saskatchewan Games, target sports are identified by the Zone 5 Sports Council. Being a target sport generally means that sport development/opportunities may be minimal within the zone and that the Sports Council will be concentrating on channelling more efforts and financial assistance into developing athletes/ coaches etc. in those sports.

Target sports for the 1994 Games include: karate, ringette, speedskating, wrestling and artistic gymnastics.

The gymnastics team will be comprised of six male and six female competitors plus one coach and one manager. Male competitors must be over 11 and under 16 years of age as of Jan. 1, 1994 (cadet compulsories). Females must be 11 years and over and registered in the Class II Provincial Stream category of the Saskatchewan Gymnastics Association.

Competition will begin on Feb. 14 and continue to the 16th: Day 1 team competition; Day 2, all-around finals; and Day 3, event finals.

Badminton will take place

during the second half, Feb. 16 to 19, 1994 of the Saskatchewan Winter Games in Kindersley.

The competition is open to all players under 18 years of age as of Dec. 31, 1993.

The Zone 5 Sports Council in cooperation with a community or sports club, will be hosting badminton playdown(s) in order to select four men, four women, one coach and one manager, to represent Zone 5 in Kindersley.

Each player is able to participate in only one event and must be individually affiliated with the Saskatchewan Badminton Association (club membership does not apply).

In 1990, Zone 5 was repre-

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sented in badminton by athletes from Cupar, Wadena, Hendon, Wynyard, Simpson and Young, and finished tied for fourth place.

Keep in mind that all coaches for the Saskatchewan Games must be Level I certified. Don't delay, phone to register for a Theory Coaching Course soon!

Bowling will also take place during the second half of the Games.

Zone 5 Sports Council will select individuals to comprise a team of five men, five women,

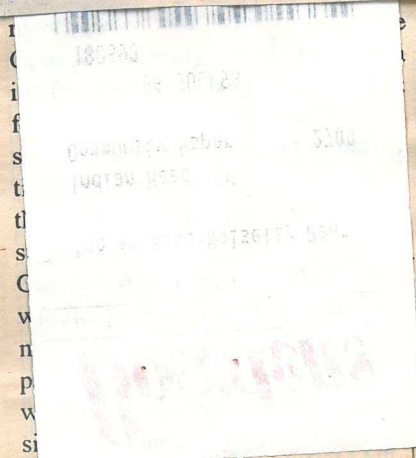
one coach and one manager, plus two men, two women, one coach and one manager for Special Olympics. A playdown will serve as the team selection process.

Bowlers must be 19 years of age and under as of Jan. 1, 1994, and be members of the Youth Bowling Council or the Saskatchewan 5-Pin Bowlers Association. Special Olympic bowlers must be 35 years and under as of

Jan. 1, 1994.

In 1990, Zone 5 placed fifth and were represented by athletes from Humboldt, Bruno, Watrous, Martensville, Wishart and Hendon.
