Several Melfort area athletes competed in the Special Olympic Winter Events in Saskatoon, and came home with lots to be proud of.

There were five athletes from Melfort competing in Cross Coun-

try Skiing. Rodney Mitchell won a Silver and a Bronze medal. Roxanne Arndt won 2 Gold, and 1 Bronze. Regan Mooney won 1 Gold, 1 Silver, and 1 Bronze. Janalynn Stonestand won 2 Bronze. Allan Gilbertson won 1 Silver medal.

Zone 8, which includes Melfort, Prince Albert, Nipawin, and Kinistino, was the team sport winner with 100 points.

Snowshoeing was Zone 8's top event with 14 athletes competing. Those competing from Melfort were: Lila Halcro with 1 Silver, Walter Heine who won 1 Gold, 1 Silver and 2 Bronze. Joanne Magnus won 1 Gold, 1 Silver, and 2 Bronze. Gordie Moss won 4 Gold. Cindy Saranchuk won 2 Gold and 1 Silver. Merrill Stonestand won 1 Bronze. Neil Sullivan won 3 Bronze.

Three relay snowshoe teams also competed. The men's 4 x 100 m, the ladies' 4 x 100 m, and the mixed 4 x 100 m all were victorious and brought home Gold medals.

Zone 8 was team sport winner with 273 points.

Zone 8 also won the team aggregate trophy with 574 points.

Their next event was the Pro Bowling Tournament in Regina March 3-5, with 20 area athletes competing.
