

# Five Junior Citizens selected

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Five young people from across Saskatchewan have been named Saskatchewan's Junior Citizens of the year.

The five will be honored at a special awards program in Regina this September. The Junior Citizens will be presented with plaques and medals recognizing their accomplishments by Saskatchewan Lieutenant-Governor Sylvia Fedoruk.

The names of dozens of deserving young people from across the province were submitted by their friends, neighbors, and teachers. A panel of judges selected the winners.

"The task of selecting the five finalists was a tough one," said Bill Johnston, chairman of the Saskatchewan Weekly Newspapers Association Junior Citizens of the Year Committee. "Each young person who was nominated deserves recog-

niton for the accomplishments they have achieved within the community, school, church, and family. It's encouraging to see the spirit of compassion and caring brought to life in a variety of ways. All those young people who were nominated deserve our thanks and encouragement to continue sharing their talents with others."

The five recipients of the Junior Citizen of the Year are:

- Angie Greer of Saskatoon, who spends a great deal of time working with mentally and physically challenged people of all ages and serves as a Special Olympics coach;
- Carolyn Jarock of Moose Jaw, who possesses a combination of musical talent, athletic ability, a strong sense of the value of home and church life, and a desire to maintain and improve our environment;

- Adam Bourassa of Melfort, who takes time out while delivering newspapers to the local pioneer lodge to visit with the elderly residents and play the piano for them;
- Brad Delorey of Moose Jaw who, although physically challenged, is always willing to accept new challenges with the goal of helping others; and
- Julie DaSilva of Prince Albert, who has been a junior volunteer at Holy Family Hospital in Prince Albert since 1990, and has volunteered more than 150 hours to date.
