You may have seen it and wondered what it is. Well, it's a 1971-72 O-Pee-Chee hockey card showing Bill Hicke in a Detroit Red Wings uniform.

Actually, that's not right.

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It shows Hicke's head on someone else's body and that body is encased in a Red Wings jersey.

You see, Hicke played in a lot of places during his pro hockey career, but he never made it to the Motor City.

And you guessed it — there's a story behind this.

At this point in time, Hicke's NHL rights were owned by the Pittsburgh Penguins, who had purchased them from the California Seals on Sept. 7, 1971.

It was about then that the Detroit Red Wings were trying, again, to put the wheels back on their organization. Which is why they brought in Ned Harkness, a hotshot coach out of Cornell University, to lead the way.

It was Harkness who called Hicke one day late in 1971 to inform him that the Red Wings had purchased his rights from Pittsburgh.

It was, said Harkness, part of a youth movement that was taking hold in Detroit. Except that Hicke was already 33 years of age.

Hicke, in retelling all of this, is laughing by now. He says perhaps Harkness thought he was talking to Hicke's brother, Ernie, who is younger by nine years.

No matter. Hicke declined the offer to join Detroit. He rehabilitated an injured shoulder on a beach near Norfolk, Va., before playing for two Detroit farm teams — the AHL's Tidewater Wings and the CHL's Fort Worth Wings.

It was some season. There was some R and R on the beach in Virginia, then, Hicke recalled, lots of golf in the Fort Worth area, where he played some at the same golf club as Ben Hogan.

By the next season, he was into the World Hockey Association with the Alberta Oilers.
