If it's true that baseball players peak in their late 20's or early 30's, then Doug Judiesch is living proof!

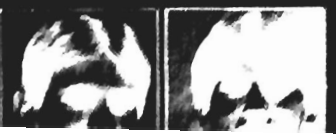
Unfortunately though, the Swift Current Indians steady first baseman the past two seasons is now the assistant coach and just part-time player with the struggling S.M.B.I. team.
